


Diabetes Canada and diabetes research

Diabetes care was revolutionized in 1922 when the first lifesaving injection of insulin was given to a child with type 1 diabetes in Toronto.

The discovery and development of insulin in Canada started a proud history of diabetes research leadership. Diabetes Canada has been a key contributor, **investing more than \$135 million** into Canadian diabetes research since 1975.



Does research improve the health of people with diabetes?

Research today improves lives tomorrow. Since the discovery of insulin, immense progress has been made to help people live better with diabetes. It's never easy to manage diabetes – but we are working to make it always easier.



A recent study showed that between 1990-2010, the rates of heart attacks, strokes and amputations all decreased by more than 50% – the result of research findings being applied to health-care practices.



Pancreas cell transplants

Edmonton researchers developed a way to transplant the pancreas' insulin-producing islet cells – helping people with diabetes live free from insulin injections



New drugs

Dr. Daniel Drucker of Toronto developed two new classes of type 2 diabetes drugs for blood sugar control that don't produce weight gain or lower blood sugar – common side effects of previous drugs




Hope for a cure
